Ben has honed his skills with guidance from multiple piano instructors, starting with his




grandmother and now, Rumi Smith, for the past seven years. Ben has won several piano competition awards in the Alaska State Piano Competition and MTNA competitions. Ben also plays the cello, studying under Joy Kil. He has performed with the Anchorage Youth Symphony for the last four years.

Ben has pursued rigorous study in mathematical and statistical analysis and has applied his knowledge to solving real world problems, from analyzing court rulings and healthcare data to building robust economic models. Ben will graduate from Robert Service High School in May as the salutatorian of his class. He plans to pursue a double major in Applied Mathematics and Biomedical Engineering in hopes of combining his passion for mathematics, computing/AI, and problem-solving with medicine to engineer future healthcare solutions. Ben also plans to explore music in college by performing in ensembles and taking music courses.

Biography Maestro Bruce Wood, Ph.D.

Dr. Bruce Wood was appointed Music Director of the Alaska Youth Orchestras in July of 2021. Dr. Wood was the founding Music Director of the Youth Orchestras of Lubbock, Texas while also serving on the faculty of Texas Tech University. From 2014 to 2021 Dr. Wood was the Director of Fine Arts for the Anchorage School District.

Dr. Wood received a bachelor's degree in music education from Morningside




College in Sioux City, Iowa and his master's and doctorate from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Dr. Wood has taught in public school settings for eleven years and at the university level for over twenty-five years. He has been published by the American String Teachers' Journal, Strings Magazine, and GIA publications.

A cellist and singer, Dr. Wood has been a member of the Alaska Chamber Singers. He has also conducted a number of the performances of the Anchorage Community Chorus Messiah. Dr. Wood's wife, Brooke, works for the Anchorage Museum.



Music Notes by Maestro Wood

Toccata in the Style of Frescobaldi

Gaspar Cassadó (1897-1966)

A toccata is a virtuosic piece designed to show off the performer's "touch." In the case of Cassadó's Toccata, transcribed by Hans Kindler, the music has rapid runs, high harmonies, and beautiful full, romantic chord structures. Cassadó attributed his Toccata, (originally written for cello) to Frescobaldi (1583-1644), but this was probably a fabrication in order to gain notoriety for his composition. When Kindler made an orchestration of it, the piece became famous and has been played by major orchestras ever since.

Piano Concerto, No. 1, Opus 25

Molto allegro con fuoco in G minor Felix Mendelssohn (1809-1847)

Soloist: Benjamin Liu

With our AYS Concerto Competition winner Ben Liu, piano, we are diving in again to experience what it is like to collaborate with a soloist. With youth orchestras, so much is new; this is Ben's first concerto performance with an orchestra, and this orchestra's first performance with a pianist since any of these musicians became members. The solo piano will announce itself with almost a defiant statement rather than a long orchestral introduction. Chief among the orchestra's challenges will be how to support Ben, and when to lead in the interludes that he is not playing.



Hungarian Dances, No. 6

Johannes Brahms (1833-1897)

One of Brahms Hungarian Dances, this number six is a delightful work that vacillates between a tranquil, almost nonchalant melody and a high-kicking festiveness that will hopefully make you feel as though you are the guest of honor at a gypsy party. The "dance" is one of those pieces that we will work on for hours in order to perform in under four minutes!

Symphony No. 8 in B Minor

Franz Schubert (1797-1828)

The first movement of Schubert's Unfinished Symphony is great standard in orchestral literature. The Unfinished (Schubert passed away at the age of 31) has a dark, brooding nature combined with one of the most beautiful lyric melodies ever written. This work requires the orchestra to make further strides in gaining a unified, classic symphonic sound. I hope our musicians will not forget playing this work and its opportunity to be inside the art they create.

Poet and Peasant Overture

Franz von Suppe (1819-1895)

Soloists: Bentley Altman & Josiah Verbrugge

This piece is for full, romantic orchestra but substantively features our co-principal cello soloists, almost concerto-like. Full of both lyricism and flash, there is much to do for the entire group. And for those of you who sometimes hear classical pieces and think "Where have I heard that before?", this work was featured in one of Popeye's cartoon shorts in which he again defeats Bluto while conducting an orchestra!

Our History

The Anchorage Youth Symphony was formed in 1965 by Frank Pinkerton and has continued under the leadership of prominent local musicians and educators including Dewey Ehling, Kurt Pasch, Jeanne (Ray) Bruhn, Charles Gorsuch, Marlow Thomas, and, most recently, Linn Weeda.



In 1981 the Anchorage Youth

Symphony Association began operating separately from the Anchorage School District and was granted 501c(3) non-profit status. Shortly thereafter the organization took adopted the name Alaska Youth Orchestras. Since then, the organization has remained an active member of the Anchorage arts community and has been a resident company of the Alaska Center for the Performing Arts since 2011.

Linn Weeda served as Music Director for 31 years, expanding the program to include coaching by local professional musicians, many who were in the youth symphony as young players. He retired in May 2021.

Maestro Bruce Wood, Ph.D., was selected as the Music Director in July 2021. Since then, he and Executive Director Denise Brown-Chythlook have expanded AYO's education and performance programs, increasing the reach from 80 to 500 youth each year. The Anchorage Youth Symphony provides a professional performance experience for high school and college age musicians. The Symphony School program provides teaching ensembles for musicians from grades 4-12. AYO's new outreach program, After School Music, a community partnership with Camp Fire Alaska, provides a music inspiration program in an after school care setting.

AYO is active in the Anchorage Arts community, participating in advocacy and community building efforts and sitting on the Anchorage Arts Alliance steering committee.

PATRON INFORMATION

EMERGENCY

Fire Exits: There are numerous, convenient and clearly marked fire exits from all areas of the Center. Note the nearest exit as you take your seat. In case of emergency, the ushers will direct an orderly exit.

Emergency Calls: (during performances) 263-2965. Please leave the following information in order to be contacted in the facility: the event, theatre, seat number, and name.

First Aid: Contact the nearest usher.

Children: It is strongly recommended that children under 6 years of age not be brought to the theatre except for family events specifically described as such by the performing organization. In any event, all patrons, including children and babies, must have a ticket for admittance.

Latecomers will not be seated until an appropriate break in the performance, as determined by the presenting organization.

Cameras and Recording Equipment: The taking of photographs or the use of any audio or video recording device is strictly prohibited in the theatres unless permission is granted by the promoter.

Pagers, Alarm Watches, and Cellular Phones: Please silence your pagers, digital watch alarm and cellular telephones before the performance begins.

Smoking is permitted outside the building only. Smoking including use of an electronic smoking device is prohibited within 20 feet of each entrance per (AO 2006-86(S) and Alaska Statute 18.35.300 prohibits smoking in public indoor places.

Bottled water, purchased from the concessionaire or vending machines, is permitted in the theatres. Generally, food and beverages are not allowed in the theatres unless otherwise advertised.

Restrooms are located on the Street and Orchestra Levels in the Carr/Gottstein Lobby; in the Harrison Lobby, they are located on all levels. Baby changing tables are located in restrooms on Street level of the Lorene Harrison Lobby & Orchestra level of the Carr-Gottstein Lobby.

Coat Check is available on the street level of both the Lorene Harrison and Carr/Gottstein lobbies from October 1-May 1.

Accessible Services Program. The Alaska Center for the Performing Arts has an Accessible Services Program to better serve patrons who experience disabilities. It is our goal to provide a fully enjoyable experience to all patrons. Through these services, patrons with disabilities should have no hesitation in attending an event at the Alaska Center. Please call Accessible Services for best available accessible seating. For more information, contact Cindy Hamilton, Vice President, at 263-2902 (voice) or 263-2903 (TTY). A brochure about the program is available at the Center ticket office, the Center administrative office as well as from ushers.

Wheelchair Availability: Patrons may borrow a wheelchair, courtesy of the Carolyn Ramey Memorial Fund, for access to and within the theatres. Call Julie at 263-2902 or 263-2920.

Wheelchair Access is available in all theatres. Provisions are made for wheelchairs at the rear of each theatre and the front of the Atwood Concert Hall. Your advance notice to the Ticket Office is requested.

Assistance for hearing impaired. Head phones are available at the House Manager Station on Orchestra Level of the Lorene Harrison or Carr-Gottstein lobbies.

Parking is available in the Municipal Garage on 7th and G hourly parking is also available at 6th and H; the Penney's Garage on 6th and E Streets; the Fifth Avenue Mall Garage at 5th and C; State Garage on E Street & 7th, and on the street.

Personal Apparel: The Management is not responsible for personal apparel or other property of patrons. Patrons are advised to take wraps with them whenever they leave their seats. Lost and found items may be claimed at the Center office. 8am to 5pm.
