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
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Biography Maestro Bruce Wood, Ph.D.

Dr. Bruce Wood was appointed Music Director of the Alaska Youth Orchestras in July of 2021. Dr. Wood was the founding Music Director of the Youth Orchestras of Lubbock, Texas while also serving on the faculty of Texas Tech University. From 2014 to 2021 Dr. Wood was the Director of Fine Arts for the Anchorage School District.

Dr. Wood received a bachelor's degree in music education from Morningside



College in Sioux City, Iowa and his master's and doctorate from the University of Wisconsin-Madison. Dr. Wood has taught in public school settings for eleven years and at the university level for over twenty-five years. He has been published by the American String Teachers' Journal, Strings Magazine, and GIA publications.

A cellist and singer, Dr. Wood has been a member of the Alaska Chamber Singers. He has also conducted a number of the performances of the Anchorage Community Chorus Messiah. Dr. Wood's wife, Brooke, works for the Anchorage Museum.








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A Note from our Board President

Dizzy Digits ~ *Richard Meyer* ~ This fun little work was designed for students to practice both finger dexterity and note-reading ability. But while being an effective technical exercise, students also love to play it! Listeners will hear the "dizziness" of the musical maneuvering, along with a couple detours in volume and character.

Baroque Suite ~ *Georg Philipp Telemann, Arr. Michael Hopkins*Telemann originally composed this suite (TWV 55:B8) for performance at the Hamburg Theater, at a time where the comedic "Burlesque" art form was all the rage. The music itself follows "fast-slow-fast" movement progression, and stays loyal to the original qualities of dance and entertainment.

Time Machine ~ *Richard Meyer* ~ The orchestra takes us on a journey through four eras of Western classical music: Baroque, Classical, Romantic, and Jazz. Navigating between each era, however, requires a special, time-traveling device, denoted by recurring motifs from the orchestra and a fun percussion part. "Time Machine" is a hit with young orchestras which combines technical challenges and new concepts with variety and good fun.

Juggernaut ~ *Stephen Chin* ~ A fiery and exciting opener, Juggernaut employs heaviness and aggression which locks musicians into a rhythmic trance.

All the Pretty Little Horses ~ Arr. Carrie Lane Gruselle
The famous lullaby arranged for the intimate setting of string
orchestra. One will hear colorful orchestral colors as well as
emotional lyricism. Listen for two expressive solos from the viola and
violin.

Symphony No. 1, 4th Mvmt ~ Johannes Brahms, Arr. Richard Meyer In the shadow of Beethoven's 9 towering Symphonies, Brahms self admittedly took twenty-one years to complete his First, suffering much perfectionism and self-doubt in the process. The results are a high achievement. The final work performed by the Symphony School Ensembles is this arrangement of the Finale, with its Alpinehorn melody at the beginning, followed by the core of the work: a warm, legato melody with reminiscence of the "Ode to Joy" theme from Beethoven's Ninth, hence receiving the not-entirely nickname "Beethoven's Tenth."

Music Notes by Maestro Bruce Wood

The Washington Post March

John Philip Sousa

Written just one year after the Kaiser Waltz, which is next on the program, the impetus for this march was to promote an essay contest sponsored by the newspaper, The Washington Post. Second in popularity only to the Stars and Stripes Forever, Sousa received a paltry \$25 for writing it, but the reception of the work (even attended by President Benjamin Harrison) was so enthusiastic it helped launch a career of over one hundred-thirty-six marches.

Academic Festival Overture

Johannes Brahms

Even though Brahms never went to college, he did indulge in college life with violinist Joachim for two months when Brahms was twenty years old. Years later, when the University of Breslau awarded the now famous Brahms with a doctorate, he sent them a letter of thanks. However, the university informed Brahms that they expected a "musical thank-you", and that was the start of the Academic Festival Overture. At times serious and other times jovial, this overture is one of the more challenging pieces of repertoire for youth symphonies. Using a student beer hall songs and traditional German songs, Brahms weaves a glorious combination of fun and majesty.

Emporer Waltz

Johann Strauss II

Okay, let's just say it: the Strauss family were nineteenth century rock stars. The family composed hundreds of dance pieces, including the "riotous modern invention" turned respectable upper-class waltz. Johann Jr. was undoubtedly the "Waltz King." Over half of Vienna's population attended the 800 balls given during the 1830s, and it was here one would listen and dance to Roses from the South, The Beautiful Blue Danube, Tales from the Vienna Woods, and, of course, the Emperor Waltz, written in 1888, when Strauss was 63. As you listen, I don't think anyone would stop you if you would like to take over a bit of the aisle and waltz to your heart's content.

Crown Imperial March

William Walton

Featuring: AYO Alumni Musicians

In 1936, William Walton was commissioned by the BBC to compose a piece for the upcoming coronation ceremonies. This work has been performed at three important British ceremonies: the 1937 coronation of George VI, the coronation of Elizabeth II in 1953, and as a recessional for Prince Williams' marriage to Catherine Middleton in 2011. Like many British marches, it is written in ABABC form, combining fanfare with glorious lyric writing.

Our History

The Anchorage Youth Symphony was formed in 1965 by Frank Pinkerton and has continued under the leadership of prominent local musicians and educators including Dewey Ehling, Kurt Pasch, Jeanne (Ray) Bruhn, Charles Gorsuch, Marlow Thomas, and, most recently, Linn Weeda.



In 1981 the Anchorage Youth

Symphony Association began operating separately from the Anchorage School District and was granted 501c(3) non-profit status. Shortly thereafter the organization took adopted the name Alaska Youth Orchestras. Since then, the organization has remained an active member of the Anchorage arts community and has been a resident company of the Alaska Center for the Performing Arts since 2011.

Linn Weeda served as Music Director for 31 years, expanding the program to include coaching by local professional musicians, many who were in the youth symphony as young players. He retired in May 2021.

Maestro Bruce Wood, Ph.D., was selected as the Music Director in July 2021. Since then, he and Executive Director Denise Brown-Chythlook have expanded AYO's education and performance programs, increasing the reach from 80 to 500 youth each year. The Anchorage Youth Symphony provides a professional performance experience for high school and college age musicians. The Symphony School program provides teaching ensembles for musicians from grades 4-12. AYO's new outreach program, After School Music, a community partnership with Camp Fire Alaska, provides a music inspiration program in an after school care setting.

AYO is active in the Anchorage Arts community, participating in advocacy and community building efforts and sitting on the Anchorage Arts Alliance steering committee.

PATRON INFORMATION

EMERGENCY

Fire Exits: There are numerous, convenient and clearly marked fire exits from all areas of the Center. Note the nearest exit as you take your seat. In case of emergency, the ushers will direct an orderly exit.

Emergency Calls: (during performances) 263-2965. Please leave the following information in order to be contacted in the facility: the event, theatre, seat number, and name.

First Aid: Contact the nearest usher.

Children: It is strongly recommended that children under 6 years of age not be brought to the theatre except for family events specifically described as such by the performing organization. In any event, all patrons, including children and babies, must have a ticket for admittance.

Latecomers will not be seated until an appropriate break in the performance, as determined by the presenting organization.

Cameras and Recording Equipment: The taking of photographs or the use of any audio or video recording device is strictly prohibited in the theatres unless permission is granted by the promoter.

Pagers, Alarm Watches, and Cellular Phones: Please silence your pagers, digital watch alarm and cellular telephones before the performance begins.

Smoking is permitted outside the building only. Smoking including use of an electronic smoking device is prohibited within 20 feet of each entrance per (AO 2006-86(S) and Alaska Statute 18.35.300 prohibits smoking in public indoor places.

Bottled water, purchased from the concessionaire or vending machines, is permitted in the theatres. Generally, food and beverages are not allowed in the theatres unless otherwise advertised.

Restrooms are located on the Street and Orchestra Levels in the Carr/Gottstein Lobby; in the Harrison Lobby, they are located on all levels. Baby changing tables are located in restrooms on Street level of the Lorene Harrison Lobby & Orchestra level of the Carr-Gottstein Lobby.

Coat Check is available on the street level of both the Lorene Harrison and Carr/Gottstein lobbies from October 1-May 1.

Accessible Services Program. The Alaska Center for the Performing Arts has an Accessible Services Program to better serve patrons who experience disabilities.
