Bentley Altman comes from a musical family—with two cellos, a trumpet, harp, and viola in the house, practice occurs at all hours of the day! Bentley started his own musical journey in fifth grade, after watching a few too many videos of The Piano Guys. He was drawn to the cello, studying under the guidance of his teacher, Linda Ottum, and has been a member of the Anchorage Youth Symphony since his freshman year of high school, serving in principal roles for three of his four years in the orchestra.



Bentley has participated in many music events in Alaska and beyond, including All-State, All-Northwest, and State Solo and Ensemble, for which he has given two command performances with chamber ensembles. Bentley has enjoyed playing chamber music going on five years, and is a founding member of *Trio Eligique*. He has participated in the Anchorage Chamber Music Festival for three summers, and also studied the piano for three years with instructor Dean Epperson.

In addition to music, Bentley has actively participated and competed in many sports activities, including as a national and international Karate champion, swimming and diving state qualifier, and as varsity high school swim and dive team captain. He has also worked and volunteered to coach many of these activities, assisting with teaching over 100 hours of beginner karate classes, and serving as a swim instructor for kids ages 4-16. Bentley is an Eagle Scout (his Eagle Scout project involved creating an alumni database for AYO), has achieved two Eagle Palms, and is an avid ailurophile.

A high school senior, Bentley will graduate as valedictorian this spring from Family Partnership Correspondence School. He is a National Merit Scholar and Presidential Scholar nominee, and plans to choose both his college and major with the help of a dartboard!



Biography Maestro Bruce Wood, Ph.D.

Dr. Bruce Wood was appointed Music Director of Alaska Youth Orchestras in July of 2021. Dr. Wood was the founding Music Director of the Youth Orchestras of Lubbock, Texas while also serving on the faculty of Texas Tech University. From 2014 to 2021 Dr. Wood was the Director of Fine Arts for the Anchorage School District.

Dr. Wood received a bachelor's degree in music education from Morningside College in Sioux City, Iowa and his master's and doctorate degrees from the



University of Wisconsin-Madison. Dr. Wood has taught in public school settings for eleven years and at the university level for over twenty-five years. He has been published by the American String Teacher Journal, Strings Magazine, and GIA publications.

A cellist and singer, Dr. Wood has been a member of the Alaska Chamber Singers. He has also conducted a number of the performances of the Anchorage Community Chorus Messiah. Dr. Wood's wife, Brooke, works for the Anchorage Museum.

Music Notes By Maestro Bruce Wood

Overture to Ruslan and Lyudmila

Mikhail Glinka

Mikhail: "I really want to do music."

Parent: "No. You need to get a real job."

Yes, I am making up the text here, but Glinka's family did not want him to pursue music. After a trip to Italy (hearing the operas of Donizetti and Bellini) and his father's death, Glinka gave his life to the art form. He composed two operas, *A Life for the Czar* and *Ruslan and Lyudmila*. Ruslan was based on an epic poem by Pushkin of folk tales he heard as a child. The overture is often played around the classical music world, while the while the whole opera is performed almost exclusively in Russia. For AYS, this is a fast moving and challenging overture, with intricate entrances and passages that make it an audition favorite.

Cello Concerto in D minor

Édouard Lalo

Once again, a dad who did not want his child to become a professional musician. Hmm.

Édouard Lalo broke out from his small town of Lille in northern France to try a career in music in Paris. Part of a string quartet in that great city, Lalo was influenced by the Beethoven quartets he played as well as others of the contemporary Austrian/German repertoire. As a composer, his two most performed works are *Symphonie Espagnole* and the cello concerto. In the cello concerto, what you will hear are a number of "set-ups" in which the orchestra poses dramatic structures that the cellist uses in cadenzas, beautiful lyric passages, or technical virtuosic sections. The first movement is a work that is, in turn, forceful and plaintive, and simply beautiful.

Symphony No. 5, Op. 47 (Finale)

Dmitri Shostakovich ~ arr. Stephen Bulla

Heaviness, drama, and forced joy. Shostakovich, during his life, was both celebrated and vilified by the Soviet Union government and propagandists. Below is from the program notes of Michael Steinberg, writing notes for the San Francisco Symphony:

"Shostakovich memoirs" published in 1979, includes a passage that seems to embody a truth about the closing moments of the Fifth Symphony. [The author] attributes these words to the composer: "Awaiting execution is a theme that has tormented me all my life. Many pages of my music are devoted to it. Sometimes I wanted to explain that fact to the performers, I thought that they would have a greater understanding of the work's meaning. But then I thought better of it. You can't explain anything to a bad performer and a talented person should sense it himself. . . . I think it is clear to everyone what happens in the Fifth. The rejoicing is forced, created under threat, as in Boris Godunov. It's as if someone were beating you with a stick and saying, 'Your business is rejoicing, your business is rejoicing,' and you rise, shaky, and go marching off, muttering, 'our business is rejoicing, our business is rejoicing.' What kind of apotheosis is that? You have to be a complete oaf not to hear that."

This Stephan Bulla arrangement of the last movement of the Fifth Symphony, I believe, keeps the mood and focus of the original work.

Danzón No. 2

Arturo Márquez

I first heard this piece from a recording I watched of the 2007 BBC Proms in London, performed by the Venezuelan Youth Orchestra with Gustavo Dudamel conducting. It was electrifying. This Cuban dance, written by Mexican-born Márquez and performed by a youth orchestra (a fine one) allows for both classical and popular Latin themes to be woven into a wonderful concert piece. AYS has really enjoyed the process of learning this and putting it together.

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Our History

The Anchorage Youth Symphony was formed in 1965 by Frank Pinkerton and has continued under the leadership of prominent local musicians and educators including Dewey Ehling, Kurt Pasch, Jeanne (Ray) Bruhn, Charles Gorsuch, Marlow Thomas, and, most recently, Linn Weeda.



In 1981 the Anchorage Youth Symphony Association began operating separately from the Anchorage School District and was granted 501(c)(3) nonprofit status. Shortly thereafter the organization adopted the name Alaska Youth Orchestras. Since then, the organization has remained an active member of the Anchorage arts community and has been a resident company of the Alaska Center for the Performing Arts since 2011.

Linn Weeda served as Music Director for 31 years, expanding the program to include coaching by local professional musicians, many who were in the youth symphony as young players. He retired in May 2021.

Maestro Bruce Wood, Ph.D., was selected as AYO's next Music Director in July 2021. Since then, Dr. Wood and Executive Director Denise Brown-Chythlook expanded AYO's education and performance programs, increasing their reach from 80 to 500 youth each year. The Anchorage Youth Symphony provides a professional performance experience for high school and college age musicians. Symphony School provides teaching ensembles for musicians from grades 4-12. AYO's most recent outreach program, After School Music (a community partnership with Camp Fire Alaska), provides a music inspiration program in an after-school care setting.

In August 2023, Pierre Derycz joined the AYO team as Executive Director, bringing a deep passion for music education and youth development. Under his leadership, AYO continues to participate in advocacy and community building efforts across the Anchorage Arts community.
